Tribal Consultation Overview

- Tribal consultation is a government-to-government process.
- Consultation happens separately from any public process.
 - Engagement with tribal members and members of the Indigenous community as interested members of the public does not constitute tribal consultation.
- Oregon ORS 182.162-168
- Washington RCW 43.376
- Centennial Accord



Section 106 Overview

- Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) of 1966 requires federal agencies to consider the effects on historic properties of projects they carry out, assist, fund, permit, license, or approve throughout the country.
 - Under Section 106, historic properties are those that are listed, or eligible to be listed, in the National Register of Historic Places.




Lyndon B. Johnson signed seven conservation bills on October 15, 1966, including the National Historic Preservation Act (LBJ Presidential Library).



Section 106 Overview

- Step 1: Initiating Section 106
 - Consulting Parties
 - Area of Potential Effect (APE)
- Step 2: Identifying Historic Properties
- Step 3: Assessing Effects
- Step 4: Achieving a Resolution





Section 106 and the IBR Program

- Historic Built Environment Baseline Survey Reports
- Section 106 Determinations of Eligibility (DOEs)
- Section 106 Findings of Effect (FOEs)
 - No Effect
 - No Adverse Effect
 - Adverse Effect





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Section 106 and the IBR Program

Programmatic Agreement

 A Programmatic Agreement establishes the roles and responsibilities of the agency and consulting parties, the agreed-upon measures to resolve adverse effects, and processes for the phased identification and evaluation of historic properties and protocols for involving interested parties in consultation as effects are identified and resolved.



Section 106 and the IBR Program: Next Steps

- Publish first formal draft of the Programmatic Agreement (spring 2024)
- Facilitate conversations around resolving Adverse Effects to historic properties (ongoing)
- Programmatic Agreement consultation (ongoing)

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CBAG Workplan – Analysis of Benefits

CBAG team

- Asset mapping
- Sorting/filtering community benefits into those that:
 - _ Are included in normal course of business or are in the program scope
 - Would potentially be in conflict with existing requirements (such as Section 106), or will only work with certain funding sources
 - Would require creating new processes
 - Rely on other partners to implement

Program initiatives

- IBR team assesses effort/cost
- Partner or external initiative
 - Partner or external assess effort/cost

Examples of Potential Community Benefits

Mobility and accessibility:

- Conduct a comparative analysis of the program area to optimize traffic flow, accessibility, and design aesthetics
- Provide shelters, water, and bathrooms for different users, with a focus on those using paths for both recreation and essential travel
- Improve wayfinding signage in Vancouver to better aid navigation, focusing on the needs of two key user groups:
 - those using paths for leisure and exercise
 - those using routes out of necessity, including business travel and people experiencing homelessness
- Consider having multilingual brown signage to mark areas of interest, natural and recreational sites and important cultural places such as Vanport
- Incorporate a Bus Rapid Transit System into the program plan



Examples of Potential Community Benefits

Mobility and accessibility:

- Create interconnected greenways and trails connecting downtowns for cyclists, bikers, and walkers
- Include an elevator in the bridge design to ensure accessibility for all users
- Create efficient public transit from downtown Vancouver to key locations, integrating design elements to improve user experience
- Transit planning for those living within 5-10 miles of the program area to preserve jobs in the area
