
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How to access closed captions



Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement (SEIS)

The Draft Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement (SEIS) is expected in spring 2024!

The program is preparing to release the document this spring, which will kickoff a 60-day public comment period.

Community Benefits Recommendations

Avoid Further Harm

- Consider monitoring for noise, vibration, and air quality
- Dashboard showing results and subsequent actions to mitigate
- Mitigate noise and dust impacts to homes during and after construction
- Require Contractors to install several electric charging stations to encourage the use of low/no emission vehicles on the site
- Work with highly-impacted residents to determine mitigations during construction, such as hotel vouchers during the noisiest/overnight operations if certain noise levels are exceeded



Community Benefits Updated Recommendations

- ► Avoid Further Harm all elements below will reflect leading and best practices and accommodate any local context and standards
 - Consider Establish systems for continuous monitoring for noise, vibration, and air quality during and after program construction, ensuring that pre-construction conditions are measured to use as a baseline.
 - Publicly accessible Community Benefits Dashboard showing results and subsequent actions to mitigate progress on all community benefits proposals and projects
 - Mitigate noise and dust impacts to homes and businesses prior to, during, and after construction
 - Require contractors to arrange off-street parking for their site employees
 - Limit closures of sidewalks, bike lanes, and bus lanes near construction sites to minimize impacts on non-motorized transit
 - Set up portable speed monitoring signs on adjacent neighborhood streets
 - Set up temporary speed bumps or speed tables to be established in key locations to prevent speeding on adjacent streets. Create a process to monitor volumes and speeds on local streets within program area and, when warranted per local traffic code, install speed bumps or tables to address safety during construction.



Community Benefits Recommendations

Avoid Further Harm

- Set up portable speed monitoring signs on adjacent neighborhood streets
- Set up temporary speed bumps or speed tables to be established in key locations to prevent speeding on adjacent streets
- Require a percentage of the contractor's equipment be low or no emission
- Retrofit diesel construction vehicles to curb air pollution
- Explore options to build permanent electric vehicle charging stations beyond temporary uses during construction phase
- Consider including the installation of electric lines in advance to avoid future disruption for charging stations



Community Benefits Updated Recommendations

- Avoid Further Harm all elements below will reflect leading and best practices and accommodate any local context and standards
 - Require a percentage of the Contractor's equipment be low or no emission Establish challenging electric vehicle or low-emissions requirements as part of contract documents
 - Require Contractors to install several electric charging stations to encourage the use of low/no emission vehicles on the site. Install electric charging stations in the construction zone for contractor use to meet EV requirements. These charging stations are to be placed so that they may become convenient public facilities after construction is complete.
 - Explore options to build permanent electric vehicle charging stations beyond temporary uses during construction phase Note: consolidate with point above
 - Install electric lines in advance of the start of construction to avoid future disruption for charging stations
 - Work with highly-impacted residents to determine mitigations during construction, such as installation of sound and dust-proof windows in a timely fashion before construction begins, and hotel vouchers during the noisiest/overnight operations if certain noise levels are exceeded, etc.
 - Retrofit diesel construction vehicles to curb air pollution prior to the start of construction

Tribal Government Consultation Overview

- ► Tribal consultation is a government-to-government process.
- Consultation happens separately from any public process.
 - Engagement with tribal members and members of the Indigenous community as interested members of the public does not constitute tribal consultation.
- Oregon ORS 182.162-168
- Washington RCW 43.376
- Centennial Accord



Section 106 Overview

- ► Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) of 1966 requires federal agencies to consider the effects on historic properties of projects they carry out, assist, fund, permit, license, or approve throughout the country.
 - Under Section 106, historic properties are those that are listed, or eligible to be listed, in the National Register of Historic Places.



Lyndon B. Johnson signed seven conservation bills on October 15, 1966, including the National Historic Preservation Act (LBJ Presidential Library).




Cultural Resources Area of Potential Effect

Section 106 and the IBR Program

Programmatic Agreement

 A Programmatic Agreement establishes the roles and responsibilities of the agency and consulting parties, the agreed-upon measures to resolve adverse effects, and processes for the phased identification and evaluation of historic properties and protocols for involving stakeholders in consultation as effects are identified and resolved.



Section 106 and the IBR Program: Next Steps

- Publish first formal draft of the Programmatic Agreement (spring 2024)
- ► Facilitate conversations around resolving Adverse Effects to historic properties (ongoing)
- Programmatic Agreement consultation (ongoing)




IBR Community Benefits Examples: Workforce Equity and Economic Opportunity

Conceptual Construction Packaging Map



This graphic is intended only to show potential contract packages. It does not reflect all design options under environmental study and does not reflect design decisions.



The IBR program delivery plan is a work in progress; this map is subject to ongoing modifications.

▶ DBE Support:

- Host regular workshops for DBEs.
- Assess needs for back-office support and technical support (i.e. accounting, payroll, estimating, plan reading, understanding specifications, etc.).
- Host prime contractor & DBE networking events.
- Institute prompt pay requirements on all construction contracts.
- Fund technical assistance, training, outreach, and support.



DBE Support:

- Unbundle work packages to create DBE prime contracting opportunities
- Require all major prime contractors to employ a DBE liaison
- Require prime contractors to have an internship/mentor program so minority college students can be exposed to project management skills
- Create dashboard for tracking DBE data
- Implement contracting and workforce strategies that hire and train local DBEs for both short-term and long-term jobs, using strategies that align with regional Construction Careers Pathways Program



Workforce Support, Outreach, and Training:

- Provide transit services to connect trainees with training sites and eventually the IBR worksite
- Provide childcare vouchers and/or create childcare center near project site for trainees and employees during construction
- Provide internship opportunities on the project with all program partners
 - Including internship programs for enrolled students
- Provide workforce training opportunities for middle and high school students
- Stable Working Conditions stagger construction packages so DBEs,
 BIPOC workers, etc. can have long term work on project



Workforce Provisions for potential PLA/CWA:

- Priority & hiring
 - Develop criteria that helps target populations such as veterans, BIPOC, women, individuals experiencing lower-income, formerly incarcerated, and individuals experiencing disabilities
 - Local hiring define what local means for IBR (e.g. 50-mile radius)
- Anti-harassment/Respectful Jobsites program
- Prevailing wage, health care, retirement
- Apprenticeship goals focused on graduation vs. apprenticeship hours only
