



How to access closed captions



- 1. At the bottom middle of your screen, you should see a menu of options. If you can't see the menu, hover your mouse over the bottom middle of the screen.
- 2. Click the square "CC" icon towards the right side of the menu to toggle captions on.
- 3. Click the submenu ^ arrow to access more settings including language, font color and font size.





ASL Interpretation

Community Benefits Recommendations – Tranche 4



CBAG Work To Date

- September December 2023
 - Initial brainstorming and visioning
- January –February 2024
 - Confirmed Tranche 1 recommendations to address time-sensitive priorities
- March August 2024
 - Brainstormed potential benefits by category
- September 2024 March 2025
 - Reviewed/refined potential benefits and confirmed recommendations



CBAG Recommendation Confirmation Process – Tranche 4

- Review updated recommendations with incorporated feedback from January and February sessions.
- CBAG members will flag any remaining edits or changes before finalization.
- ► CBAG members will participate in a Fist to Five vote to confirm recommendations for program consideration.



Mobility & Accessibility (MA):

- MA 17: Involve experts with lived experience and representatives of the broader community in transportation planning to ensure that designs effectively address the mobility and accessibility needs of various groups beyond minimum ADS standards, especially individuals with disabilities, lowincome individuals, and communities of color.
- MA 18: Implement periodic reviews and revisions to the infrastructure plans post-implementation construction to ensure they continuously meet community needs, and adapt based on practical use and feedback through reengagement with individuals with disabilities and underserved communities.
- MA 25: Incorporate safety metrics, such as parent comfort-level for bike paths and level of traffic stress in urban design to ensure user-friendliness and safety.

Physical Design (PD):

 PD – 14: Ensure early integration of aesthetics into the bridge design by securing buy-in from elected officials and allocating budget early.

*Integrated into PD-11

- PD 16: Incorporate educational information related to ecosystem health, cultural heritage, near the waterfront about and local vegetation, with considerations for long-term maintenance and accessibility for plant and add identifying markers and signage. for native plants.
- PD 19: Consider ecological impacts when developing lighting designs, including considerations for mitigation of impacts on migratory birds and other wildlife.
- PD 20: Install well-designed, concealable garbage cans to maintain the bridge's cleanliness and aesthetic appeal.

Community Benefits (CB):

- CB 6: Provide online access to 3D models of the program to aid in visual understanding of the design.
- CB 7 (This recommendation includes CB-7, CB-8, CB-12 and CB-13): To the greatest extent possible, the IBR program should actively support local government and community efforts, both during and after construction, related to:
 - Affordable housing
 - Equitable, transit-oriented development
 - Community development efforts, including childcare access



Community Benefits:

- CB 8: Explore opportunities for repurposing existing retail areas and underutilized properties for community development
 - To potentially include community centers, an inclusive civic center, shared parking for the waterfront public market and transit station. Explore integrating community centers with affordable housing developments and healthcare services.

- CB 11: Clean up the contaminated areas at Support local efforts to improve and maintain the East Delta Dog Park between MLK and N Union Ct to ensure it can be used year-round.
- CB 12: Work with program partners to support organizations in self-ownership of mobile homes by assisting with funding, leveraging loans, and land trusts

*Consolidated into CB-7

 CB – 13: Explore opportunities to build a grocery store and a childcare facility during the planning stages of Jantzen Beach.
